□ ABSTRACT

Agricultural organizations have been at the forefront of opposition to Japanese participation in the Trans Pacific Partnership (TPP), claiming it will not only destroy Japanese agriculture, but the very foundations of Japanese society. Conversely, the prospect of TPP participation has sparked a lively debate about reforming Japanese agriculture, and agricultural policy, in the interests of Japan's economic, diplomatic and political future. From being a drag on the economy, moreover, there is an emerging interest that the agri-food sector might become a dynamic part of Japan's future in Asia, where food security concerns loom large. The seminar explores the death of the postwar system, and prospects for a new emergence.

D. Hugh Whittaker is an industrial sociologist, professor at the University of Auckland Business School, and director of the New Zealand Asia Institute. He previously taught at the University of Cambridge, and at Doshisha University, Kyoto. He is the author of numerous books about small firms, employment, management and innovation in Japan, most recently *Comparative Entrepreneurship: The UK, Japan and the Shadow of Silicon Valley*, and (co-edited) *Corporate Governance and Managerial Reform in Japan*.
